How Wellfleet Bay Wildlife Sanctuary Helps Birds

- Our sanctuary was previously an ornithological field station. We continue that legacy by actively working to protect birds. With the help of many devoted volunteers, we maintain bird habitat, monitor bird populations, and advocate for bird conservation.
- To protect coastal waterbirds on the Outer Cape, we use symbolic fencing, predator exclosures, and electric fencing. Populations of Piping Plovers and Least Terns have increased significantly since these protection efforts began in the 1990s, and American Oystercatchers have recently begun nesting on the sanctuary.
- We manage two coastal heathlands for rare plants and birds. Of the twenty endangered plants and animals found on the property, half are heathland residents. Several rare and declining Massachusetts breeding birds nest in these habitats, including American Kestrels, Northern Bobwhites, and Northern Harriers. Our ongoing heathland restoration efforts include cutting, mowing, and prescribed burning.
- We erected many Osprey poles on the Mid and Outer Cape, and our Cape Cod Osprey Project uses volunteers to map and monitor nests all across Cape Cod. The project has revealed many more nests than anyone had known for this little studied Osprey population, while involving many people in local citizen science research.
- We conduct an annual breeding bird census, state waterfowl surveys, and summer/fall shorebird counts at the sanctuary.
- We organize a spring hawk watch at Pilgrim Heights in Truro. We count migrants from March to the end of May.



Mass Audubon's Statewide Bird Conservation Projects

Important Bird Areas (IBAs) are sites providing essential habitat to one or more species of breeding, wintering, and/or migrating birds. The statewide portfolio of 79 IBAs represents critical habitat for every bird species regularly occurring in Massachusetts.

Birds, like many Massachusetts residents, flock to the coastal areas of our state. We help protect Piping Plovers, tern species, and coastal habitat at 90 sites in southeastern Massachusetts.

This important work cannot be done alone. We depend on the support of our members and work closely with many other organizations, agencies, and landowners.

How you can help.

Turn your checklists into data and contribute to Mass Audubon's knowledge and understanding of Massachusetts' birdlife and the birds of our wildlife sanctuaries. Keep a list of birds on your walk and log on to www.massaudubon.org/ebird to submit your observations. Your sightings will be stored in a database that Mass Audubon scientists can use to track birds on our sanctuaries.

Help us collect important data by participating in Mass Audubon bird monitoring programs including the Oriole Project, the Whip-poorwill Survey, the second statewide Breeding Bird Atlas, or our sanctuary breeding bird surveys.
